Charity Ball surpasses goal, raises \$13,000 for new initiative

The Junior League of Portland's third annual Charity Ball was held on New Year's Eve 2016 at the Urban Studio in Northwest Portland. The festive black tie-optional event was a great way to ring in 2017.

Partygoers danced the night away and welcomed 2017 in style. With a VIP lounge, open bar and delicious catered hors d'oeuvres, a fun photo booth, party favors, balloon drop and champagne toast at midnight, the event helped the League reach their fundraising goal for the League's new initiative, The 1910 Campaign, and its partnership with New Avenues for Youth. New Avenues for Youth, an almost

20-year-old Portland nonprofit, has delivered support and comprehensive resources to over 21,000 foster, at-risk and homeless youth aged 14-24.

In all, more than \$13,000 was raised for the 1910 Campaign — which was more than \$5,000 over our goal for the event! If you haven't seen the photos from this fabulous night, they're available on the JLP's Charity Ball Facebook page.

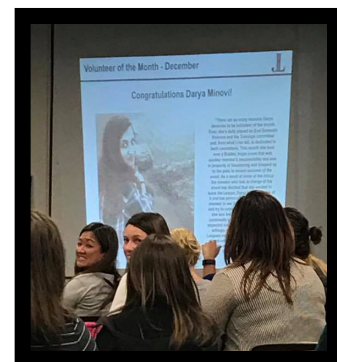

Two sustainers share their journey with JLP

Jill Arena and Beth Warner both donated their time and talents to the 2016 JLP CAREs Committee as Sustainer Advisers, and their knowledge and expertise were a large reason for the massive success of the 2016 JLP CAREs event and the Harvest Soirée and Auction. Both Jill and Beth have helped the Junior League of Portland for many years and have left a lasting impact.

Jill joined JLP in 1996, and was an active member for eight years. She ran Providence Health System's Family Medicine division, and said she appreciated the flexibility of JLP — some years, her professional life allowed her the time to sit on the board or chair a committee, but other years, when she had less time, she could serve on a committee and still be an active member. After the birth of her daughter in 2004, she became a Sustainer.

Despite a long tenure with the League, Jill resigned after her first provisional year. She had spent time volunteering at Bradley Angle and appreciated the training she received in that placement, but she felt that the volunteer opportunities were not organized in a way that was the most beneficial to the residents of Bradley Angle.

Upon hearing of her departure, Chris Swanson, the JLP president at that time, called Jill and they talked for an hour and 45 minutes. By the end of the phone call, not only had Jill decided to return to the League, she also had volunteered to chair the Endowment Committee. Jill jokes that Chris can be credited for any good

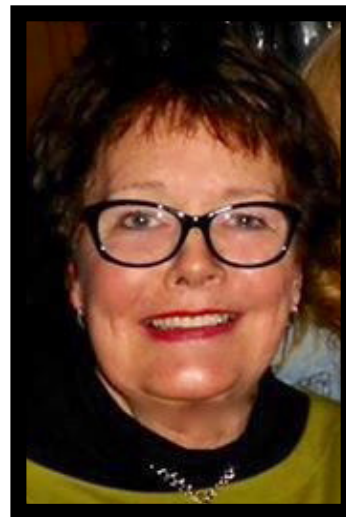
that came from her time in the League, as well as any undesirable outcomes.

During Jill's time in JLP, she served numerous years on the board. Around 1998, she was responsible for taking minutes as the Recording Vice President. She decided to bring her laptop to the board meeting to do minutes in real time; it was the first time anyone had done that, showing how much times have changed in 18 years.

One of Jill's most profound legacies was the creation of a Leadership Track. In the early 2000s, it was difficult to find members who were willing and able to take on leadership positions in JLP. Jill, along with Margo Fowkes, began a one-year placement that provided leadership education to members via monthly meetings and a Sustainer mentorship program.

After Jill's active membership in the League, she continued to volunteer in the nonprofit sector. Given her business knowledge and leadership skills, she found she provided the most impact to an organization by serving on the board. She spent 10 years as a board member for Outside In, a nonprofit that helps marginalized populations move towards improved health and self-sufficiency. She was able to volunteer internally by facilitating mock interviews and offering teenaged youth internships at her business.

Given Jill's experience at the board level for multiple organizations, including JLP, she has sage advice for those who may want to sit on a nonprofit board. Her first recommendation is to look for a cause that you can be passionate about. A board member donates a lot

of time, and if you are not passionate about the organization, it can be difficult to give that time away. She also suggests that individuals vet the organization as if they were vetting a job prospect to ensure it's the best use of their time and talents.

BETH

Beth Warner joined JLP in 1983 and continued as an active member until 1993. She joined because, though she was already involved in multiple philanthropic

organizations, she wanted to expand her volunteer work in the community and be with women who shared similar goals and values.

During Beth's first Active year, she co-chaired the 75th Anniversary Committee. The anniversary celebration had three components: a large party complete with a live band and gourmet catering on a vacant floor of the then newly constructed PacWest building, a showcase of Portland's arts and music for League members and their families at the recently opened Arlene Schnitzer Concert Hall, and the gift of park benches constructed by inmates from the Oregon Penitentiary in the South Park Blocks of Portland — a legacy that still benefits Portland residents and tourists.

Beth continued her service to the League by chairing the Cookbook Research Committee (circa The Portland Palate edition), chairing the Marketing Committee and chairing the Community Assistance Fund. She also reviewed grants for the Oregon Community Foundation. On the Board, she served as Administrative VP, Director of Development and President. As a Sustainer, Beth has an advisory role to the League and has volunteered in many capacities, including serving as the Sustainer Representative to the Board and being an integral sustainer mentor for the one-year leadership track placement Jill helped create.

After Beth became a sustaining member of JLP, she worked for Friends of the Children and CASA. She was also active in various neighborhood and community organizations throughout the Portland metro. In her professional life, she began her career in administrative positions and moved into grant writing, development work and fundraising, partially credited to the JLP. She is also a jewelry maker, a hobby that has become an

entrepreneurial endeavor. She now donates pieces to auctions and other events if asked and leads an annual jewelry workshop for Sustainers.

There have been several changes in the League since Beth joined. During her Active years, membership was around 2,000 with about 1,000 active members. Membership began to decline in the years following. She also noted that there were few women who worked outside of the home at that time, so most meetings were held during the daytime—which doesn't happen much anymore due to work and childcare schedules.

As far as the League's structure, placements were not as focused. Beth believes our updated focus statement is very beneficial and will allow us to make a larger impact. She is excited to see a renewed enthusiasm and increase in interest for the League. During her most recent Sustainer Advisory role, she was impressed with the professionalism, organization and enthusiasm of the members. It reminded her of the vigor of the League when she was an Active.

Her advice to current members is have fun and enjoy what they are doing in the community, as small actions add up. She also advises them to enjoy the people they work with, as some of her best friends were met through the League. She said there is a powerful bond made between individuals working through issues for a common goal.

We cannot thank Jill and Beth enough for their continued support of JLP. Without generous and talented Sustainers, the League would not be able to flourish as it has.

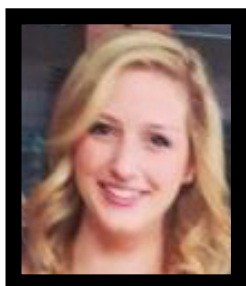
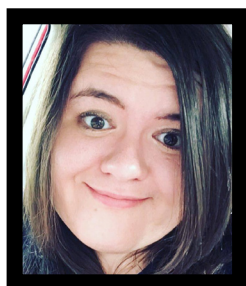

Neighborhood meetings, new transfers group help advance League

Last year the Provisional Committee for Junior League of Portland added a project for Provisionals in order to give them hands-on experience running and working a large-scale community service project. This year we created a project that engages with and benefits one of our favorite partners, the Children's Book Bank (CBB). The 2016-17 provisional class will be running a book drive with the goal of collecting 15,000 books to be donated to CBB.

This provisional class has 125 mem-

bers and is run by a committee of 23 members. Throughout the month of March, these provisional and active members will be running a 3-part project that includes:

- Grassroots book collection at local connections such as members' offices, teams, schools, etc.
- Book collection at local stores
- A large-scale cleaning event in March to ensure all donated books are ready to be packaged and gifted to children and families

We encourage all members and Sustainers to gather their no longer wanted and gently used children's books.

JLP joins organization coalition to promote gender equality in Oregon

At the beginning of this League year, the Junior League of Portland became a member of the Oregon Women's Equity Coalition to advance the JLP mission. The OWEC is a collaboration of organizations that serve women and girls to advance equitable services and policies that promote gender equality through research, advocacy and collective action.

As members of OWEC, JLP sends a representa-

tive to monthly meetings and to participate on a subcommittee. In doing so, we have learned about events and educational opportunities in the community that we have shared with our members. Through this collaboration, JLP also plans to learn more about how we can better support efforts to end the cycle of violence against women and children. Additionally, our involvement will provide us with the opportunity to learn more about upcoming legislation and OWEC-hosted events, such as educational panels.

The JLP member who is a liaison to OWEC may also have the opportunity to help plan events with OWEC in the future. Our involvement with OWEC is still new, but we are excited about the opportunity to collaborate with and learn from other organizations working to support women and girls.

1910 Campaign selects New Avenues for Youth to benefit foster youth

The 1910 Campaign is underway. In honor of our 110th anniversary, the Junior League of Portland has reimagined the Special Appeal Campaign, which has the goal of raising and gifting \$110,000 by the year 2020 for work on a joint project to benefit a new partner, New Avenues for Youth. This partnership comes at a pivotal time for JLP. We are growing both in membership and talent; now it is time to grow our impact as well.

With the League's focus statement recently amended to reflect our work on ending the cycle of violence against women and children, along with the general fund becoming stable with a strong fundraiser in the Harvest Soirée, we have a solid and growing endowment. It is a wonderful opportunity for us to celebrate our strength with a partnership that aligns with our values, helps us to grow and allows us to give 100 percent of the funds raised back to our community in an impactful way.

The 1910 Campaign committee began meeting in early 2016 to establish a framework for partnership and a process for vetting applicants. We were looking for an organization that was interested in working with us to fundraise, had a program or project that needed funding, aligned with JLP's mission and might include a naming opportunity as well as recognition for JLP. The 1910 Campaign committee is chaired by Kristin Kilshaw and co-chair Leslie Nevius, with Sustainer Advisers Trink Easterday, Julie Branford and Kaycee Wiita. Committee members include Bonnie Stewart, Kim McNally, Justine Hanrahan and Jill Horley.

We received nearly a dozen applications from organizations in Portland and SW Washington. New Avenues for Youth was selected, in part, for its program Project Niyyah, which helps commercially and sexually exploited children. New Avenues for Youth, which is about to celebrate its 20th anniversary, has delivered support and comprehensive resources to over 21,000 foster, at-risk and homeless youth aged 14-24. Programs include a drop-in day center where youth have access to three meals a day, mental health and substance abuse counseling, and a program for LGBTQ teens. Project Niyyah is part of a larger youth support program run by New Avenues for Youth called PDX Connect, which is a life skills program supporting youth transitioning from foster care and New Avenues

aimed at encouraging and supporting foster youth into higher education.

Our partnership has started strong. We have already begun to create a committee with members from both JLP and New Avenues for Youth to develop Project Niyyah and create a plan for fundraising together. The committee raised \$11,000 for the project even before hosting the first 1910 Campaign fundraiser, the New Year's Eve Charity Ball, which raised nearly \$15,000. We are excited about this new partnership and its potential and look forward to sharing our strength for years to come.

End Domestic Violence brings Christmas cheer

The week leading up to Christmas, 35 Junior League of Portland volunteers contributed 126 volunteer hours at Rose Haven to support their annual Holiday Kids Party.

Rose Haven had received bags upon bags of donated toys from local businesses and churches. JLP volunteers helped organize and setup prior to and during the event. When volunteers arrived days before the event, they got to work sorting and organizing each gift by age and gender. Their help allowed the next wave of volunteers to start gift-bagging presents for the 92 families with a total of 285 children, aged from newborn to teenagers, that would receive gifts through Rose Haven. Each child was given an outfit, socks, gloves, a book and two toys. Families also received games and stuffed animals.

As Thursday morning arrived, JLP volunteers welcomed families into the festive party with a delicious breakfast and a bountiful raffle. Each family member was able to put their name into a raffle for gifts such as play kitchens or Kindles. The raffle was quite a hit and lead entirely by JLP volunteers.

In the middle of the morning, Santa arrived. He took a seat at the photo booth and families gathered around for pictures.

Finally, JLP volunteers distributed 92 bags of presents to the families. From sorting, bagging, and helping families carry the bags to their cars, the JLP volunteers made it possible.

Cleanup went so quickly with the JLP's support. The Rose Haven staff took a picture of the clock when the room had been broken

down, vacuumed and swept so fast. Rose Haven staff and guests were so grateful for the help of the Junior League of Portland.

Rose Haven serves women and children experiencing the trauma of abuse, loss of home, and other disruptive life challenges. In 2015, Rose Haven served a record 2,917 unique women and children who collectively visited 17,752 times. Rose Haven serves in many areas, including meals, hygiene kits and one-on-one appointments with advocates assisting guests with housing, job searches and more. By supporting their Holiday Kids Party, the Junior League of Portland made steps toward ending the cycle of domestic violence in Portland.
